Academic Needs	Milestones provided free summer school in June 2021, June 2022 and June 2023.			
	Milestones started utilizing iReady, an online academic program for reading and math, in August 2020. The program assesses students at the beginning/middle and end of the school year to determine individual academic placement and areas that need academic support. Students are placed on an individual path to strengthen areas of need. Teachers and Administration can use this data to differentiate instruction within the classroom.			
	Milestones also utilizes Dibels assessments to progress monitor student's reading fluency and comprehension needs.
